Year 10 - Keys4life

Over Term 1 and into Term 2 the Year 10 students have been participating in the Keys4Life, a pre-driver program. The program helps to educate young people about safer road use and allows them to sit their Learner's Permit Theory Test. Preparing young people for safer driving is an important component of the Western Australian road safety strategy as each year young drivers are over-represented in road crash statistics. The students in Year 10 have been working hard in learning the road rules, simulating scenarios and workshopping the risks associated with being a new driver. National Sorry Day - 26 May



On 26 May, across the school, students and teachers found meaningful ways to teach students about Sorry Day. They engaged in discussions, completed a range of activities, and deepened their compassion and understanding about Sorry Day.

The "crinkled heart" was one of the activities completed on Sorry Day. It provides a visual element to a meaningful metaphor. The Pre-Primary classes engaged in a discussion about what Sorry Day is, and why it exists. They talked about the Aboriginal Flag and what the colours represent. Students coloured in heart shapes, utilising the Aboriginal flag colours, and wrote "sorry" on the back. They were told the hearts represent the hearts of the Stolen Generations. They were then asked to crinkle and scrunch the hearts up into balls. This represents how the hearts of the Stolen Generations were broken. Students were asked to try their best to make the hearts perfectly flat again; to fix them. Students soon realised that they couldn't! This is like Sorry Day. While it does help, and is necessary in the path of healing, it doesn't fix everything. The Aboriginal people, and Stolen Generations are still hurting.

The hearts of both Pre-Primary classes were used to create a collage, to signify unity and coming together in the name of compassion and understanding. Sorry Day falls just before the commencement of Reconciliation Week, which will see the continuation of such work throughout the school.

Expedition Time for Duke of Edinburgh International Award Students

After a long wait and some changes to the original plan, as Covid regulations waxed and waned through Western Australia, the first ever group of 'D of E' students at Court Grammar found themselves leaving the safety of the minibus for the great outdoors.



A mixed group of 8 students, spanning Year 8 to Year 10, have been training every Monday after school in skills such as expedition planning, route cards, mapwork, and camp craft. With full rucksacks and an autumn chill in the air, our explorers set out from Kalamunda, which is the northern terminus of the Bibbulman Track. They were hoping to reach their destination of the Perth Discovery Centre, near Mundaring, some six hours and 17 km later. The key difference between a 'D of E' expedition and the average outdoor activity is that the students are unaccompanied. They plan their route and walk their route as a team, independently and unaided. The teachers set up check

points along the route, wherever there was access by road or forest path to the Bibbulman Track, timing the progress of the students against their classroom calculations.




Students tend to overestimate their ability to navigate and walk up and down hills with heavy packs for hours at a time. However, this first group of Court Grammar students got it right first time and hit every checkpoint either on time or slightly early. This gives them useful feedback for their assessed expedition in Term 3. This was an amazing walk through some outstanding landscapes, including the forested hills of the Kalamunda National Park and across the O'Connor Reservoir as the path crosses the weir and into the hills on the Eastern side. On the way, there were spectacular views, including the lunch stop at South Ledge. Not content with the view from the ground, Jack flew his drone high above the forest and snapped the birds-eye view across the treetops and down to the O'Connor Reservoir

There is also the small matter of completing 3 or 6 months of a skill, a physical activity, and a service activity until someone becomes the first student to achieve a Bronze award at Court Grammar. Yr 10 First Aid

The Year 10 students recently participated in the St John of God First Aid focus training. This was a practical course that focuses on developing students' skills. The aim of the course was to provide every student with an opportunity to practise the priority first aid skills. By the end of the session the students were able to demonstrate the management of an unconscious casualty who is not breathing normally by using the DRSABCD action plan and CPR.

The First Aid Focus program aims to train and equip students with the skills to assess and respond to first aid situations, while developing strategies to seek help for themselves or others. The practical skill-based sessions support students learning by teaching them how to enhance their own and others' health, safety and wellbeing in varied and changing contexts.

The sessions also provide opportunities for students to:

- Develop and refine resilience skills.
- Learn and practice the ability to make safe decisions, manage risk and take actions to promote the health and safety of themselves and others.
- Learn to take a critical approach to access, analyse and apply a variety of resources for the benefit of themselves and the community.

For the first time at CGS, the students also had the opportunity to use the skills learnt on the day to respond to a variety of first aid scenarios, using state of the art VR goggles. This was a highly engaging activity and excellent viewing for the spectators.





CHAPLAIN'S CHAT

REVEREND NOEL OAKEY



I have been fortunate enough to spend some time this year talking to some primary classes about prayer. No matter how old you are, or whether you go to school, university or are working, starting the day with prayer is always a great idea.

With that in mind, here are three things you may want to consider praying about before you go to school each day. You can pray these things in just a couple of minutes, and they will help you focus on living each day for the glory of God.

1. Give thanks

Think about your life and all the good things God has given you. Thank Him for these things. It always concerns me that students in Australia look so sad when they come to school. Having worked overseas with young people who have been blessed with the opportunity to learn, the response to school is different.

Thank God that you are able to go to school, to learn and grow as a person. With almost 60 million children around the world who don't have access to education, give thanks that you do.

Especially, let us pray for the children and educators in Ukraine who have had their education disrupted and perhaps denied. We give thanks to educators who in refugee and makeshift situations are still endeavouring to give students the opportunity to learn.

2. Pray for someone else

Ask God to help you treat teachers and other students with love and respect.
