In an ever-changing world where technology can often take over, it is of paramount importance that we keep our young people as safe as possible. Using cyber space responsibly is an integral part of both our Digital Technologies and of Protective Behaviour lessons at Court Grammar School – particularly with our very youngest technology users. As you know only too well as parents, children learn about technology and how to use it much quicker than we ever did! I thought it would be wise to share with you some information about apps and programs to be extra mindful of. In School, we often encounter social and emotional issues which are directly related to the use of technology and social media. In trying to keep our children happy, safe and harm-free, this graphic offers us some important details that perhaps previously went unknown.

**MEETME**  
MEETME is a dating social media app that allows users to connect with people based on geographic proximity. As the app's name suggests, users are encouraged to meet each other in person.

**GRINDR**  
GRINDR is a dating app geared towards gay, bi and transgender people. The app gives users options to chat, share photos and meet up based on a smart phone's GPS location.

**SKOUT**  
SKOUT is a location-based dating app and website. While users under 17 years old are unable to share private photos, kids can easily create an account using a different age.

**WHATSAPP**  
WHATSAPP is a popular messaging app that allows users to send texts, photos, voicemails, make calls and video chats worldwide. WHATSAPP uses an internet connection on smart phones and computers.

**TIKTOK**  
TIKTOK is a new mobile device app popular with kids used for creating and sharing short videos. With very limited privacy controls, users are vulnerable to cyber bullying and explicit content.

**BADOO**  
BADOO is a dating and social networking app where users can chat, share photos and videos and connect based on location. While the app is intended for adults only, teens are known to create profiles.

**BUMBLE**  
BUMBLE is similar to the popular dating app "Tinder" however, it requires women to make the first contact. Kids have been known to use BUMBLE to create fake accounts and falsify their age.

**SNAPCHAT**  
SNAPCHAT is one of the most popular apps in recent years. While the app promises users can take a photo/video and it will disappear, new features including "stories" allows users to view content for up to 24 hours. Snapchat also allows users to see your location.

**KIK**  
KIK allows anyone to contact and direct message your child. Kids can bypass traditional text messaging features. KIK gives users unlimited access to anyone, anywhere, anytime.

**LIVEME**  
LIVE.ME is a live-streaming video app that uses geolocation to share videos so users can find out a broadcaster's exact location. Users can earn "coins" as a way to "pay" minors for photos.

**HOLLA**  
HOLLA is a self-proclaimed "addicting" video chat app that allows users to meet people all over the world in just seconds. Reviewers say they have been confronted with racial slurs, explicit content, and more.

**WHISPER**  
WHISPER is an anonymous social network that promotes sharing secrets with strangers. It also reveals a user's location so people can meet up.

**ASK.FM**  
ASK.FM is known for cyber bullying. The app encourages users to allow anonymous people to ask them questions.

**CALCULATOR%**  
CALCULATOR% is only one of SEVERAL secret apps used to hide photos, videos, files, and browser history.

**HOT OR NOT**  
HOT OR NOT encourages users to rate your profile, check out people in their area, and chat with strangers. The goal of this app is to hook up.

Arrival at School ...

Could I please offer a friendly reminder that children should not be in and around the playgrounds or classrooms prior to 8 am each morning. At this time, there is no supervision for the children and, in the interests of safety, children should not be unattended.

Supervision is in place from 8 am onwards for students arriving via the Kiss and Drive. Students who enter at the front gate are welcomed into School at 8 am. If children are going to be dropped off earlier than 8 am, they should be dropped at the front gate.



**Semester 2 reports** shall be with you as we enter the holidays at the end of Term 4. Just a reminder that these are posted home after the completion of Term 4. Alongside the report is a letter offering some information about how we actually report upon progress and how we use the many tools that are at our disposal via the Schools Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCSA) to do so. Please keep in mind that these reports are indicative of progress made with concepts taught in Semester 2, they are not to be seen as a summative or final report for the whole year. Semester 1 and Semester 2 hold very different content in teaching and learning across the School and this should be considered. I would also remind all parents and caregivers that if children achieve a 'C' grade, this equates to them achieving at an age-appropriate level and this should be celebrated.


### Examination Preparation for all Students

Year 11 students will sit their examinations during Week 6, followed by Year 10 examinations in Week 7 and Year 7-9 students sitting their examinations during Week 8. The key to examination success is frequent and consistent preparation. Below are three of the best techniques to use when preparing for your examinations.

- Frequency – Completing a small number of revision activities each day is a more effective revision method than completing a lot of revision just prior to the examination
- Test yourself – Access past tests, past examination papers or study guides, the best way to prepare for an examination is to do an examination, so practice on exam-style questions, also use study 'flip' cards to test yourself or buddy up with a friend and quiz each other.
- Mixed practice – Examinations typically have you recall information or skills across a number of different fields studied throughout the year. You'll have greater success if you practice questions each day from a range of topics rather than spending a week revising one topic then the following week revising another topic.

### Academic Prizes on Presentation Night

Students are encouraged to strive for academic excellence and pursue academic prizes awarded on Presentation Night. The highest achieving student in each subject will be awarded with an academic prize on Presentation Night.



## Music Tuition 2020

A reminder to parents that if you wish to withdraw your child from Music lessons in 2020, a withdrawal form must be submitted to Mrs Barlow **no later than the end of week 7 of this term**. If no withdrawal form is submitted by the end of the term then your child will be put back into the timetable for next year and invoices sent home during the summer holidays. This year, Court Grammar is again participating in collecting goods for the Anglicare Christmas Appeal.



I have listed below a list of the school supplies that Anglicare are appealing for. They will also accept financial donations and donations of gift cards to purchase the supplies with.




## **Court Grammar Uniform News**


**All uniform items, except the school bag and socks with the SJGS logo, are to be with the Court Grammar logo from 2020.**
