Orientation Day

This week, we held our Orientation Day; a day for new and existing students to come together with their teachers and education assistants for 2020. Being able to offer all of our students a day in the life of 2020 is very important to us. It allows students to feel more at ease with who they will be learning with and where their learning will take place. As a community, we must accept that decisions for class and teacher placement should not be a secret, but rather shared and celebrated in order to relieve any anxiety or worries that children may have. By all accounts, it was a successful day. I must offer an apology that we ran out of sausages at the sausage sizzle! On previous occasions, we have been left with so many sausages which have

gone to waste, so this time, we took this into account. It is testament to our strong community flair that so many people attended, but I do feel so bad that we ran out. However, I am very pleased that families and staff had the chance to mingle and meet one another, which is of course the intention behind the event. Could I please take this opportunity to remind everyone that lots of careful consideration goes into the placement of students with staff and other children. In making these decisions, we consider many factors such as gender balance, ability spread and friendship groups. Class teachers largely make these decisions as these are the people who hold the most accurate information about our students on a day-to-day basis. May I also make a reminder that class and teacher placements remain at the discretion of the School. As previously communicated, requests are always taken into account, but never guaranteed.



Early Learning Environments

Following on from our Orientation Day, students are now fully aware of where their learning environments will be for 2020. Please note that there are changes to the physical layout of some Early Learning environments next year. Some of you may recall that the present Year 1 building was originally our Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten building. This building will revert to this purpose in 2020 as it is best suited to younger, smaller children in terms of its size and functionality. Year 1 have been more than adequately accommodated here in 2019 with only 29 students, but with increasing numbers for 2020, we feel that these older students require a larger space in which to learn and grow. This has a knock-on effect in other learning areas. Therefore, the present Pre-Primary classrooms (2019) will accommodate Year 1 in 2020 and the present Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten space (2019) will accommodate Pre-Primary in 2020. We are very fortunate that we have beautifully designed and maintained learning environments across the whole School and we have a wonderful team of staff delivering top quality educational experiences to all children throughout the School. Our staff team have already started preparing for how these environments will take shape in 2020 following our nature pedagogy and 'home from home' feel. We are all looking forward to 2020.

SECONDARY NEWS

On Tuesday 19 November, our current year 6 students were joined by students from local primary schools for our 2020 Year 7 Orientation Day.

The theme of the day was based around the school's values of Community and Humility. The focus was to get to know one another and have new experiences. The day began with a series of ice-breaker challenges. The birthday line challenge required students to find others who had birthdays nearest to theirs, in which we discovered some 'secret twins' amongst the students. Answering 20 questions in a speed-dating format required the students to share personal stories, experiences and interests with each other.

Once the students began to know each other, it was time for many of our new students to discover the school campus in more detail. What better way to explore the campus than engage in an amazing-race style activity with our current year 6 students. Students explored Foundation Square, the sporting facilities, the year 9 challenge activities completed by past students and even ventured over to the Early Learning Centre in search of the answer to the challenging questions.

The students were then divided into groups and attended demonstrations and activities in Science, they challenged each other in a spaghetti tower competition and Physical Education engaged students in a basketball camp.

Students finished the day reflecting on their newly-made friendships, and experiences. This group of students truly demonstrated humility towards each other and a strong sense of community. I look forward to 2020.

Yr 11 Integrated Science



This term, the Yr 11 Integrated Science class investigated the process of decomposition. They designed an experiment to investigate the rate of decomposition when chicken carcasses (standard raw roast chickens from Steggles) were placed on different substrates or environmental conditions. The control situation was on a concrete block, and the other substrates were on mulch, on sand, suspended in the air, and submerged under water. As expected, blowflies were the first insects to arrive on the scene, along with meat ants, while the chicken on sand was visited by bandicoots who consumed a portion of the carcass over the first few nights. By Day 4 while our chickens were in the process of "Active Decay" and were nice and

smelly, we welcomed thousands of maggots into the world who would begin their very important 'clean-up' job. We returned after the weekend to find the decomposition process had stalled, sadly, with the death of all the maggots due to the extremely hot weekend weather. Although there should have been a new round of maggots laid on the Monday in the cooler weather, the unusually cold weather and rain for the rest of the week set this process back once more and we concluded the experiment on Day 10 amidst the storm. In conclusion we found that the environmental substrate definitely had an effect on the process, (our sand carcass was the most decomposed by Day 10) however the weather was the single most important factor since temperature effects so many of the life, and death, processes!

I would like to remind our community that we are again participating in collecting goods for the Anglicare Christmas Appeal.

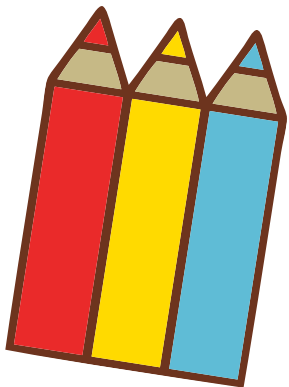

I have listed below a list of the school supplies that Anglicare are appealing for. They will also accept financial donations and donations of gift cards to purchase the supplies with.

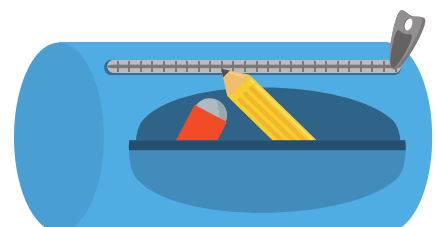
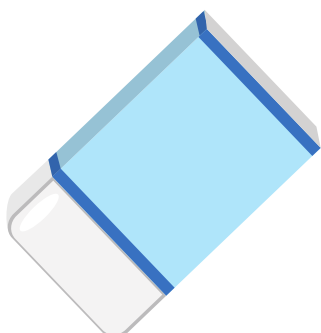
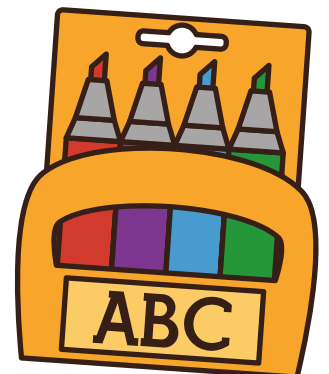

Information from the Child and Adolescent Health Service

Scoliosis

Scoliosis is an abnormal sideways curvature of the spine. It can be detected by a simple examination of the back.

The normal spine has three curves – one in the neck, one in the upper back and one in the lower back.

These curves can be seen from the side, but when you look from behind the spine should appear straight. If the spine has a sideways curve, this is scoliosis.

An information leaflet about Scoliosis will be distributed to all year 6 students in term 4.

Please read through the information provided and check your child for scoliosis as described in the leaflet.

Colour Blindness

Colour blindness means that a person cannot distinguish some colours or see the colours differently to other people. Very few people who are colour blind are 'blind' to all colours.

Commonly, the colours seen differently are greens, yellows, oranges and reds.

An information leaflet on colour blindness will be distributed to all Pre-Primary and Year 6 students in term 4. Please take the time to read the pamphlet.

All families will be provided with useful handouts including activities for home and school and a summary report of their child's performance.

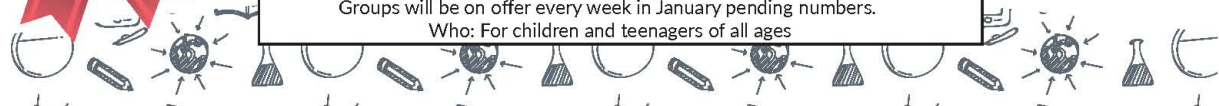
